## IMPORTANT TO EXHIBITORS:

All pre-fair entries must be sent to: Renville County Fair, PO Box 279, Bird Island, MN 55310, before August $1^{\text {st }}$. Competition for premiums is open to any resident of the State of Minnesota.
No open class for animals.


#### Abstract

Entries are to be made WITH THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE DIVISION, NOT AT THE SECRETARY'S OFFICE. When an entry is made, the Superintendent of the Division will give you a duplicate containing the Division letter and the number of the entry. Exhibitors must check to see that the information is correct and that the goods are in shape to be intelligently judged. Sealed articles must be opened if necessary. Superintendents will take charge of their respective departments and see that they remain undisturbed during the Fair. Only one exhibit per exhibitor will be permitted in any Lot of Divisions.


Entries in all the departments will be received from 6:00-8:00 p.m. on Monday, August $7^{\text {th }}$ and 8:00-4:00 p.m. on Tuesday, August $8^{\text {th }}$. All articles and items entered for premiums must be exhibited from 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, August $9^{\text {th }}$, until 10:00 p.m. of the last day of the fair. $* * N E W * * 4-H$ Members only - you may enter open class exhibits on the Sunday before the fair when you general Projects.

All articles and items entered must correspond in number, kind, and description with the Premium List in order to obtain a premium. No premiums will be given on entries not listed. Premiums shall not be awarded to articles or items that are inferior, even though there shall be no competition. The same articles or items cannot compete for more than one premium, unless it be a sweepstake or special premium, nor can any article or item entered for a specific premium go to make a variety or display for which another premium is offered. Blue is the color of the first premium and red is the color of the second premium. In the case there is not enough money in the treasury to pay the premiums in full, they will be paid pro-rate.

THE RENVILLE COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY will take every precaution in their power for the preservation of articles and stock on exhibition, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur during their delivery upon the grounds, their exhibition, or removal. Exhibitors must attach cards to their items on exhibition, showing ownership, and any information desired. Such cards are to be removed by the Superintendent before being view by the judges. Borrowing, hiring, or temporarily buying items or any articles what so ever for the purpose of strengthening their exhibits, for show is positively prohibited, and if the same is reported to the Secretary, said entry will be barred from competition and will not be awarded any premium. If it shall be ascertained that an exhibitor had made any false statement in regard to any article or item exhibited by him/her/them, or if he/she/they shall attempt to interfere with, or influence the judges in any manner, he/she/they shall be excluded from competition.

Premiums will be paid only on classes of what is listed in this Premium List. Protests against the awarding, on the grounds of incompetency, or previous bias, must be made in writing to the superintendent of the class before the award of the committee is declared. All protests and appeals from the division of the awarding committee or judges must be made in writing to the Secretary BEFORE THE FAIR CLOSES. Judges of sweepstakes will give the award of the item or exhibit, that they shall judge to be the best type of representative of this class. The Fair Association will not be responsible for personal injury sustained to any exhibitor, employee or patron, or any damage done to any exhibit or property. Animals to be exhibited at the Renville County Fair can only be exhibited with the 4 H Club. Minnesota Livestock Health and Sanitary Board Section I

All public exhibitions or shows of livestock on behalf of the 4 H program, including state and county fairs, shall be under the supervision of the Minnesota State Livestock Sanitary Board, hereinafter called the Board.

## Section II

MANAGEMENT OF EXHIBITION
The management of an exhibition shall:
A. Comply with all reasonable orders of the board or the official veterinarian pertaining to the sanitation of premises and the health status of all livestock and poultry exhibited.
B. Clean and disinfect all building and exhibit areas for the use of livestock and poultry prior to the opening date of the exhibition and ruing the exhibition if livestock and poultry are released and new livestock and poultry are brought to the exhibition premises, and maintain the areas in a sanitary condition. C. Provide quarantine facility for any livestock or poultry showing symptoms of infectious or communicable disease. If a quarantine facility is impractical, any livestock or poultry showing symptoms of infectious or communicable disease shall be removed from the premises by the exhibitor veterinarian.
D. Employ an official veterinarian when cattle, swine, sheep, goats, horse, or poultry are exhibited.

## Section III <br> RESPONSIBILITIES OF OFFICIAL VETERINARIAN

The official veterinarian shall:
A. Approve the cleaning and disinfection of the exhibition premises prior to the exhibition and during the exhibition of livestock are released and new livestock are brought to the exhibition premises.
B. Inspect all livestock on the day admitted to the exhibition.
C. Refuse admission of livestock exhibiting symptoms of any infections or communicable disease, or of livestock not meeting the admission requirements of this part.
D. Inspect all livestock at least once daily during the exhibition and order the immediate removal to the quarantine facility or removal from the exhibition's premises of any livestock with symptoms of infectious or
communicable disease, and order and
supervises the cleaning and disinfection of the area from which the diseased livestock was removed.
E. Conduct any necessary tests at any time to determine the health status of the livestock on the exhibition grounds. F. At the conclusion of the exhibition, report to the Board violations or parts 1715.0005 to 17115.0162 and other information concerning the exhibition as request by the board; and
G. Retain for a period of one year all official forms.

## Section IV

 HEALTH CERTIFICATESA. All livestock shall be accompanied by a health certificate issued by a qualified veterinarian within 90 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition, executed on the official health certificate form of the state where the livestock originated.
B. No livestock under quarantine or originating from a herd or flock under quarantine for a communicable disease, shall be exhibited or allowed entry into the exhibition premise.

## EXHIBITION OF LIVESTOCK IN MINNESOTA SUMMARY OF STATE RULE

 General RequirementsThe exhibition management may adopt more but not less restrictive health requirements than required by the state rule. Livestock known by the exhibitor to have an infectious, communicable disease or to have been exposed to an infectious, communicable disease or to be from a quarantined herd may not be entered in an exhibition. Warts and ringworm are considered communicable disease. Therefor livestock affected by these diseases cannot be exhibited. A statement from a veterinarian that an animal is being treated for these diseases is not acceptable. All livestock will be inspected by the Official Veterinarian on the opening day of the exhibition and display during the exhibition. The Official Veterinarian will order the immediate removal to a quarantine facility or removal from the exhibition premises of any livestock with symptoms of infectious or communicable diseases. Animals placed in a quarantine facility must remain there until removed from the exhibition premises. They may not enter a show ring. This includes livestock with warts or ringworm.
All testing must be conducted prior to the exhibition, and a record of the test
results on a test chart or Interstate Health Certificate must accompany the tested animals. Livestock entered in a Petting exhibit are not exempt from the exhibition rules if the animals are from more than one farm or there are other animals at the exhibit.

SWINE (Originating from Minnesota): All swine (including barrows) must have a negative pseudorabies test within 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition or originate directly from a Qualified Negative or Qualified Negative Gene-Altered Vaccinated herd.
Differential pseudorabies tests are approved for exhibition of Minnesota swine. For exception to test requirements, refer to "Slaughter Classes"
DOGS:
Dogs over 6 months of age mut be accompanied by a current certificate of Rabies Vaccination issued by a Licensed Veterinarian.
HORSES:(Originating from Minnesota) Equine infectious Anemia (EIA) testing required (NOTE: See general requirements.)

## CATTLE, GOATS, SHEEP:

(Originating from Minnesota) No specific requirements. (NOTE: See general requirements)
CATTLE, GOATS, SHEEP, HORSES, SWINE: (Originating Minnesota) Animals must meet the Minnesota Importation Requirements in addition to the requirements outlined in this summary. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must; list the name of the exhibition as consignee. Certificates will be accepted if examination and tests are conducted within 90 days prior to the exhibition, except swine pseudorabies tests, which must be made with 30 days the GPE ELISA test is approved for importation of swine.
SLAUGHTER CLASSES (Terminal Shows): No health certificate, tests, or individual identification is needed if animals are isolated in a separate building from all other classes and all animals are slaughtered during or immediately following the exhibition. Common unloading chutes, alleys, and scales may not be used. A common show ring may be used if the slaughter class is shown last. Some swine terminal shows, including the Minnesota State Fair, do require testing

## Harvesting Tips

Try to harvest root crops when the soil is relatively dry. They should not be woody or overgrown. Tops should be trimmed to 2 inches above the crown. Long tops draw moisture from the roots and cause shriveling. Take care not to break the - natural protective skin or outer layer of the specimen. Stems should be left on all vegetables ex-cept tomatoes and muskmelons. the stem helps keep the vegetables from drying out.

## Cleaning Tips

Dirt detracts from the appearance of vegetables, but it is not advisable to wash all vegetables to clean them. Ten-der-skinned vegetables such as peas, beans, summer squash, peppers, tomatoes, and eggplant should be wiped clean with a soft cloth. If necessary to wash root crops, soak in cool water and gently wash with soft cloth; do not scrub. Leafy crops such as cabbage, lettuce, spinach, and Swiss chard can be washed carefully. A soft bristled brush can be used to clean cauliflower, kohlrabi, cucumbers, and onions of any soil.

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## BROCCOLI:

Heads should be dark green and com-pact. Avoid yellow flowers in head. Stems should be cut 5-6" from the top of head.

CABBAGE: Select firm compact heads. Stems should be cut $1 / 4$ " below the head. Leave 2-3 outside wrapper leaves.

CAULIFLOWER: Heads should be white, compact and not ricey. Stems should be cut to leave 4-6 leaves. Trim leaves to $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ above the white head.

CUCUMBERS: For pickling, select fruits 3-5" long. For slicers, select fruits straight, dark green, 6-10" long.

EGGPLANT: Trim stems to 1 1/2-2". Calyx should be green. Avoid large fruits.

KALE: Select plants with bright stems and dark green crisp leaves. Wash roots and exhibit whole plant with roots in water. Lower leaves may be removed if discolored.

## KOHLRABI:

Ball should be 2-3" diameter with root removed just below the ball. Trim back leaves on upper one-third of ball to 46 ". Remove all other leaves.

## LIMA BEANS:

Seed should be full grown but still tender and before they have changed from green to white.

## MUSKMELON:

Harvest fruits when they separate easily from the vine. Specimens should be free of spots.

## ONION:

Have specimens mature and cured. DO
NOT PEEL! Remove extremely loose outer dry skins. Leave on dry skin that is clean and fairly tight to the bulb. Roots should be clean and left on the bulb, trimmed back to $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$. Trimmed dried, twisted tops to 1 " to 2 ".

## PEAS:

Select bright green, well-filled pods. Do not wash the bloom. Leave stems as beans.

## PEPPERS:

Select specimens that are uniform in size, shape, and color. Trim stems to $1 / 2-$ 1 ". All specimens should have the same number of lobes.

## POTATOES:

Tubers should be uniform in size and shape. Washing is permitted, but do not scrub. Avoid defects or disease.

## PUMPKIN:

Specimens should be mature. Trim stems to 2". Wipe Clean

## SNAP BEANS:

Harvest before seeds appear, when the seeds are about half grown. The ends of the pods should not be broken. The entire stem should be left on. Avoid showing blemished or wilted specimens.

## SUMMER SQUASH:

Select small to medium fruit. Leave stem $1 / 2$ ". Zucchini, straight neck and crookneck should be 6-8". Round, scallop type 2-3".

## SWEET CORN:

Select ears well filled out to the tip.
Kernels should be milky. Trim silks to
1 ". Trim shank to 1 ".

## SWISS CHARD:

Select plants that are fresh, crisp and bright green. Trim off roots and trim butts to pyramid shape.

## TOMATOES:

Remove stems. Fruits should be perfectly shaped and free of cracks or blemish. Show with the stem scar down.

## WATERMELON:

Fruits should be mature but not overripe. Leave 1" Stem. Wipe Clean.

be awarded

## Guide for Specimen Display Exhibitors

1. New exhibitors are encouraged and will be given special guidance in registering and exhibiting.
2. Where possible, long uniform stems are best.
3. Foliage, healthy and free of injury, should be left on. Remove foliage below the water line.
4. Blooms should be as uniform in size as possible and true to type.
5. Be sure to have the correct number of blooms or stems required - no more or no less. Extra flowers may be brought along in case a specimen is damaged.
6. Blooms should be near or "at peak," never over bloomed for best exhibit.
7. All Dahlias should be "disbudded," but foliage left on.
8. Leave "leg" (seed pods) on Cleomes.
9. Remove foliage from "Bells of Ireland."
10. Definitions: BLOOM - a stem with a single flower, such as Nasturtium. BRANCH - off-shoot from main stem, such as Rose. SPIKE - length of stem or stalk, usually unbranched and elongated bloom, such as Snap Dragon. STEM main axis of a plant; leaf and flower bearing, such as Sweet Peas. SPRAY terminal flowering growth of stem - could have lots of flowers, such as Chrysanthemums. VARIETY - refers to color or kind.
